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
Winter in Europe is a season of magic, when festive lights illuminate historic streets and winter markets come into full swing.

Where to go

Classic winter destinations



London, England

From bustling winter markets to iconic landmarks and an all around festive atmosphere, London has it all. Enjoy Hyde Park's Winter Wonderland, Oxford Street's dazzling lights and Covent Garden's unique gifts. After exploring the Southbank Centre Winter Market for delicious street food and crafts, enjoy warming up with some signature afternoon tea.



Vienna, Austria

Imagine enchanting palaces draped in twinkling lights and grand boulevards adorned with festive decorations. During the colder months, the city comes to life with classical concerts, ballet performances and outdoor activities. Be sure to check out Vienna Ice World – and its enormous 8,500m² ice rink – sitting beneath the capital's iconic Rathaus city hall.

Paris, France

Paris in winter is like a scene from a romantic movie. Stroll along the Seine, sip hot chocolate at a cozy café and marvel at the Eiffel Tower sparkling against the night sky. Don't miss the charming markets, ice skating at Hôtel de Ville and the festive lights on Champs-Élysées. Paris in winter? C'est magnifique!





Prague, Czech Republic

The city's historic centre is a haven for budget travellers, a mecca for architecture aficionados and just an epic winter destination for anyone. Enjoy free walking tours, affordable eateries and the magical Prague Castle under a dusting of snow. Try not to get lost in the maze of cobblestone streets—Google Maps can only do so much.




Budapest, Hungary



Edinburgh, Scotland




Wrocław, Poland

Head to budget-friendly Wrocław for impressive architecture, mouth-watering food and romantic strolls along the Odra River. Your inner child will love the fairylike winter market and the charming gnome statues scattered over the city. This calls for a quirky scavenger hunt, illuminated after dark by one of Europe's last lamplighters.



Barcelona, Spain

Barcelona's mild winter days are perfect for exploring. Stroll down La Rambla, admire Gaudí's masterpieces and enjoy quiet beaches. Visit Mercat de Sant Josep de la Boqueria for delicious Catalan cuisine. And if you find yourself at the beach, just wave winter farewell.



Florence, Italy

Florence in winter offers
Renaissance charm without
the crowds. Enjoy the Uffizi
Gallery and Michelangelo's
David in peace. Warm up
with Italian hot chocolate
in cozy cafes and explore
festive Christmas markets
in Piazza Santa Croce. With
fewer tourists you'll save a
few extra euros too—and
gain priceless elbow room.



The Hague, Delft and Rotterdam, The Netherlands

Each of these iconic
Dutch cities are charming
destinations. They're only
minutes away from each
other by train. On the same
day you can sample
Rotterdam's street art and
food, explore the quaint
architecture of canalringed Delft and end on
The Hague's Royal Christmas
Fair — or even in The North
Sea for a traditional (and
ice-cold) New Year's Dive.

Europe by rail

Interrailing across Europe in winter offers a unique opportunity to explore multiple destinations in a way that doesn't cost the Earth.

Train travel takes you right into the city centres of your choice, while allowing you to experience the scenic beauty of Europe at a leisurely pace.

Central European capitals

Discover the iconic cities of Berlin, Prague, Vienna and Budapest on a single journey. Each city offers a mix of history, culture and winter activities, all connected by efficient (night) train services. If you fancy some winter sports, head up to the world-renowned Alps or the more affordable Carpathians.

On track to Scandinavia

This convenient night train runs from the irreverent German capital of Berlin to the picture-perfect Swedish capital of Stockholm. Between the long railway bridges that link Scandinavia with the European mainland, it's possible to stop over in the Danish capital of Copenhagen for some more winter hygge.

Northern lights express

Start in Stockholm, Sweden and travel through Norway to Narvik, where the Northern Lights await. This route combines stunning landscapes with the magic of the Arctic Circle, including the opportunity to go free skiing on the illuminated slopes of Narvikfjellet.

Mediterranean meander

For a less frosty experience, start in Paris with festive markets and the Eiffel Tower, then head south to Lyon for gourmet delights. Then you could explore Barcelona's Gaudí wonders and detour to Madrid's vibrant tapas scene. End your journey in Florence's art-filled streets and Rome's ancient landmarks.





Train, not plane

According to Eco Passenger you can cut your footprint by up to 40% on average if you choose to travel by train, not plane. Trains are energy efficient and often powered by renewable energy, making them more eco-friendly than cars and planes. And have you considered that train travel requires less security checks and city transfers, saving you much time and hassle in the end? Win-win.





Vienna, Austria

→ What makes it unique: Viennese food

The Viennese Winter Market, also known as Weihnachtsmarkt, is a great opportunity to stuff your face with some traditional Austrian food, like baked potatoes, fresh bread, strudel, hot pretzels and candied nuts. After you've gotten your fill, how about getting active on the ice-skating rink. If you're lucky, snowy weather will blanket the already well-decorated market, creating an instantly instagrammable scene that will make the home front jealous.



Copenhagen, Denmark

→ What makes it unique: Big 'hygge' and twinkling lights

While the city hosts several winter markets, the events at Tivoli Gardens steal the spotlight as the biggest and brightest. The gardens are adorned with half a million twinkling lights, which you can also take in from above when riding the Ferris wheel or even the many faster rides in the park. And when hunger strikes, indulge in local treats like caramelised almonds, gingerbread hearts and cinnamon-infused gløgg—Denmark's delicious twist on mulled wine.





Berlin, Germany


→ What makes it unique: Alternative markets

Naturally, Berlin puts its own spin on the beloved German tradition of winter markets. With over 80 different markets scattered across the city, there's something for everyone, from the traditional to the delightfully quirky.

For something unique, check out the Dog Christmas Market held especially for the four-legged, or head to Potsdamer Platz for winter sports like tobogganing and curling. Spandau hosts Berlin's largest market, complete with daily shows and a medieval arts & crafts section, while the Weihnachtszauber at Gendarmenmarkt dazzles with picture-perfect glittering lights.

Pro tips for winter wanderers

How to make your European winter travels extra comfy and affordable.



Tour for free

Explore the city's history and culture at no cost (just tips!) on free walking tours. Some museums even offer free admission days during the winter or discounts for younger travellers.



Eat in, then out

To save money, order from surplus food app 'Too Good To Go' or cook simple breakfasts and dinners. Then you can visit local markets and restaurants for lunch, where midday menus are often cheaper.



Ride for less

In most European cities public transport is cheaper on day passes or weekend travel cards. For travel between cities and countries, consider an Interrail pass or car sharing apps.



Scan the skies

European weather is volatile. Sudden changes in sunshine, wind and rainfall can feel like you've moved continents. Before every outdoor outing, inspect the forecast, plan accordingly and bring layers just in case.



Layer up

If you plan to explore colder parts of Europe, woollen underlayers and woollen socks are your friend. Also pack lip balm, gloves, hats, boots and a warm, windproof jacket.




Reuse
